LOU MALATSKY



**Denmark River Probus meeting 7 October 2015 – Speaker Mr Lou Malatsky, Retired Electrical Engineer/Whale Researcher**

We were very fortunate in having Mr Louis Malatsky talk to us regarding his experience researching whales, most of which was carried out in the Broome region. He became a volunteer 8 years ago in Broome and was 3 years with Deakin University researchers and the WA Marine Science Institute. It was well attended by approximately 50 members and doubt very much whether you would have had this many people attend this subject in Japan!

He gave us an insight into the sheer size and weight of whales and some of their habits. The Blue Whale can weigh up to 200 tons, be 33 metres long and has 12,000 litres of blood, the heart pumps 10,000 litres a minute. The human body has approximately 6.5 litres of blood and pumps at approximately 5 litres per minute. Slight variation between the two species.

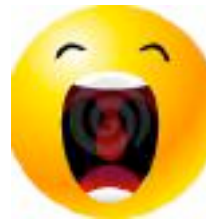
Humpback whales are the furthest travellers up to 12,000 kilometres. Their fin is 4 metres in length and weighs about 4 tons. They make the loudest sound of any creature.

He told us the young are born tail first in case of difficulty, and to prevent drowning being mammals. The mother's milk is like toothpaste, 40% fat. Lou warned us that the mega ships trawling for Krill (major diet of Baleen whales who consume 1000kilos a day) are endangering their food supply, and asked us to protest by not purchasing it. Whale calves take 18 months to reach maturity. They give birth in the warmer waters in the north of Australia, avoiding hypothermia as the young have no blubber.

One member asked why they beach themselves and Lou said the theory was barnacles but apparently the jury is out on this matter.

Lou then showed us some magnificent photographs of these majestic creatures, rolling and swimming on their backs and with their calves.

After his talk, Wally and "his helpers" served us with a delicious barbeque of sausages and marron, a treat for many of us. Thanks to all the ladies who provided the salads and gorgeous desserts. Very little was left. And of course, thanks to all the men who cooked and did the dishes, what a pleasant sight. It was a great lunch, enjoyed by all.

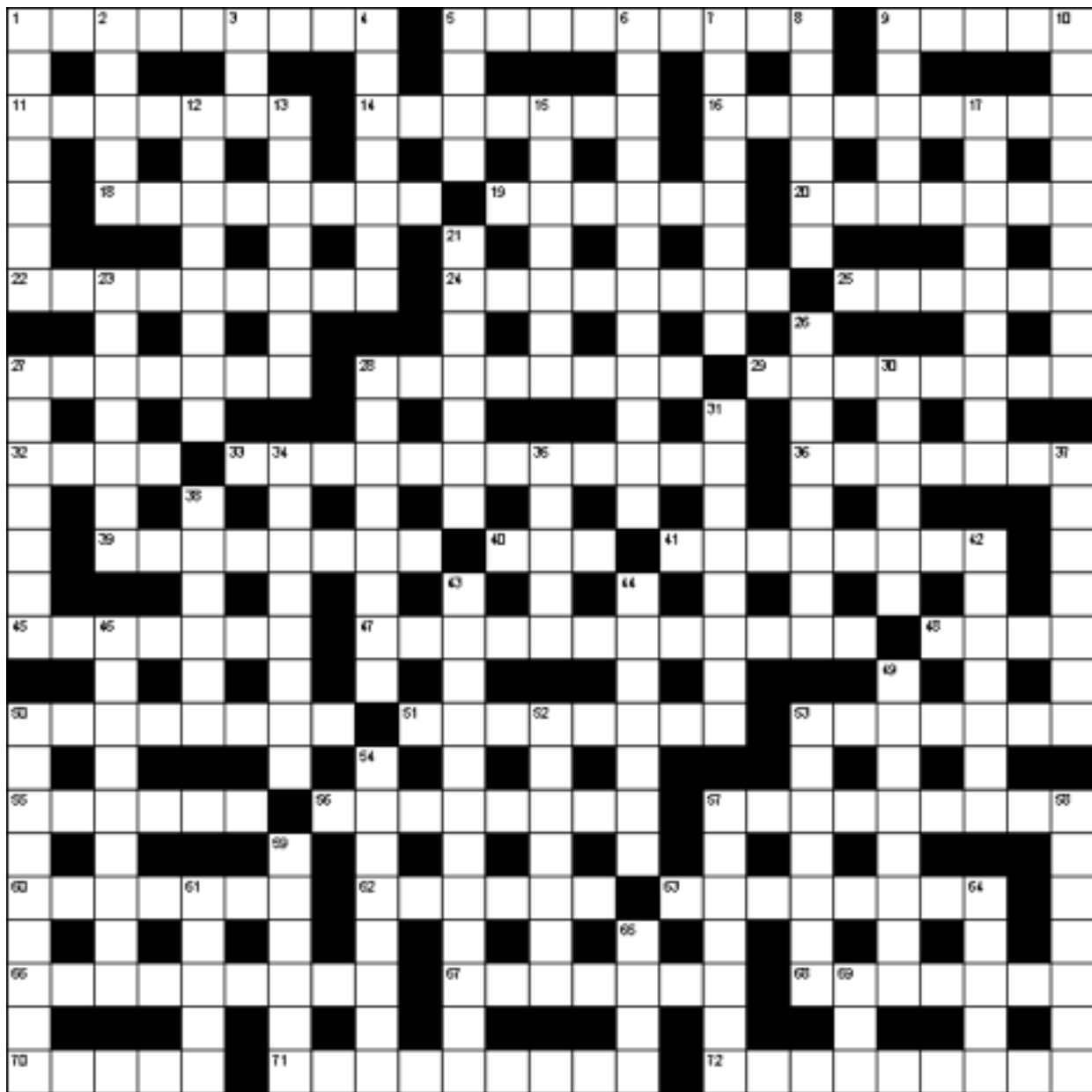

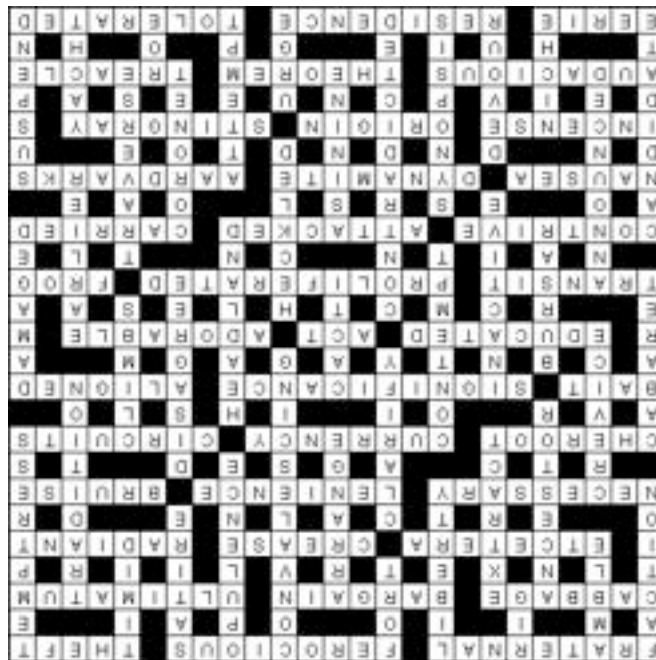
