A truly great 2.5 hours with a heady combination of relaxation and entertainment.



Chris Probert –inspiring volunteer designer
Our talk on 2nd March was by Chris Probert who like many of us in Probus has retired to beautiful Denmark "where the forest meets the sea".

The very special thing about Chris is that he had been a mechanical engineer who has not left behind the need to tinker and innovate. After volunteering for the fire brigade, his mind turned to the risks of fire burn over. Combining his training as a volunteer with his extensive background in design and engineering plus support from others with interest and advice, Chris came up with a prototype for an alternative to the stipulated safety plan of getting into the cab, wrapping yourself in a special blanket and turning on the deluge system. While this is an improvement on previous systems, in the event of a serious burn over you could find vourself, having followed best practice, sitting in a cab with a melting steering wheel and an interior cabin trim which self-ignites at 400°C. This would be some time after you had succumbed to the toxic fumes of your plastic surrounds.

We saw Chris's slides of the early design – a tea chest size box with the treble layer of protection heated to an outside temperature of 800 °C.

Outside the chest was a raw egg in a tinfoil container looking like you might expect after being exposed to that temperature. Inside a similar test egg white was just solidifying at 60°C. That is a bearable, if uncomfortable, temperature for a human being for the average duration of a burn over.

Chris has obtained crowd funding to make the prototype and has found it can be easily installed in fire engines and operated by volunteers with minimal training. Feedback from firemen and volunteers is that they feel the Shadrach would offer very worthwhile protection for two or three people in the event of a burn over. His task now is to have the device tested and certified by CSIRO. He owns patents on his design so looks forward to keeping control of the quality of the equipment. A question and answer session followed Chris's talk and President Kay noted that more interest had been engendered in this topic than in any other to date. Chris would welcome support in getting his idea tested and tried so that he and his fellow fire fighters, professional and volunteer, are at slightly less risk from the life threatening fires that our beautiful country is prone to suffer. He was applauded for his commitment to safety and it seems that many Probus members took on board the need to support this worthwhile venture.

among some older residents that there was a 'King's Hut' on the west and of Wilson Inlet on the north-facing shore of Nullaki

Last year a long-time resident of a pioneering family in Denmark out about it and whether the story was true.

It turned out to be a fiscinating exercise which, at the same time, yielded the likely answer together with more information about Dennark's (and in the process, Albuny's) past.

In 1881, the English royal princes, George and Albert, came to Australia on the HMS Bacchante, which had rudder damage on route, and called into Albany for repairs.

This allowed the princes to spend three weeks there.


During their visit, arrangements were made for them to stay with the Young family at Marbelup (Marbelleup) on the custern shore of Wilson Inlet, at the Youngs' Hut. (shown in the left of the picture).

Eventually, after their visits in and around Albary, they continued their journey to Adelaide.

Prince George became King George V in 1910.

Denmark did not exist in 1881, other than the Denmark River. named by Surgeon-cum-Explorer T B Wilson in 1829 when his ship was also held up in Albany for Perth and a number of places in repairs.

In 1920, King George's son Edward, Prince of Wales, later King Edward VIII (who abdicated in 1936 to marry American divorces: Mrs Wallis Simpson Wallis) briefly visited Albany in HMS Renown.

He was accompanied by Lord Logis Mountbatten.

His itioentry included a visit to the South-West, which included an

a rest but had been built for his visit (top-right picture).

However, his train was detailed shortly after leaving Jamedup (now Jardee), south of Manjimop, and his schedule was abandoned.

The party returned to Porth without staying at the rest but.

Of the denillment, the Prince was reported in The West Australian as saying: "This is great fire - Hort?" Blos your heat, no. And I'm glad to say the whisky flask is not busken either".

The but was subsequently used as a store-shed for some years, and later burned down in a bushfire. So there was apparently no 'King's

Normalup rest but built for Prince Edward's planned visit.

Also probably slipping easily into folklore would have been the Young family's but on the inlet at Marbalup (Marbellup), where the Princes had earlier stayed.

Further research located a last on the western end of the Nullaki near Ocean Beach, where the story of a King's Hut had developed.


This appeared to be Archdescon Struggedl's place, which was later dismuntful and used for chalets at Guns Grove on Wilson Inlex.


Archdeacon Strugnell was Dennurk's Anglican Minister in 1957. Gordon Harris 9848 1539
