Hello all,

Recently it came to my attention that I needed a soak well added to my garden. I happened to mention this to a male acquaintance and suddenly found myself inundated with more information than I ever though I would need to know about digging holes.

I naively thought I could just grab a shovel, stick it in the ground and get to work. No, no, no, it is not that simple it seems.

First you need to figure out why you need a hole and where you need to put that hole. Well, that bit was under control - soak well - near drain pipe.

July Speaker Heather Marr

Heather, at very short notice (less than one hour) agreed to come along to share her knowledge and experiences in her role as a Registered

Migration Agent. Her informative and engaging presentation delivered with commitment, passion and free of political bias uncovered the little known complexities of immigration in Australia and internationally.

To introduce her presentation she asked if anyone could explain the terms refugee and asylum seeker. A nervous silence followed.

This was the perfect springboard for Heather.

As explained by Heather, a refugee is a person who

- Is outside of their own country
- Has a well founded fear of being persecuted (or harmed) if returned to that country
- The harm feared is because of one or more of the 5reasons listed on the United Nations Convention ethnicity nationality religion political opinion membership of social groups

An asylum seeker is a person whose request for sanctuary has yet to be processed.

Heather expanded on the each of these definitions outlining the processes involved to ensure that existing protocols were met. She cited specific examples of the processes involved and provided insights into the despair felt by those who might never be able return to their homes or ever see their families again.

It was a very sobering presentation.

By the end of her talk we were all more fully away of the enormity of the current situation worldwide along with greater insight into the uncertain future for those who are compelled to flee their own country.

Heather was warmly acknowledged for agreeing to speak to us at such short notice and more importantly for her sobering presentation

Recipe shared by Kaye White

Lumberjack Cake

2	Medium apples, peeled, cored and cubed
125g	Dates
60g	Dried Apricots, chopped
1 tsp	Bicarb Soda
³ ⁄4 cup	Boiling Water
1 cup	Brown sugar
125g	Butter
1	Egg
1 tsp	Vanilla essence
1½ cup	S.R. Flour



Pre-heat oven to 180C (170C fan-forced). Grease and line a 23cm cake tin.

Combine apples, dates, apricots and bicarb soda in a medium bowl. Add water and leave for 10 minutes. Beat 125g butter, caster sugar, vanilla, and egg, until light and fluffy. Slowly add apple and date mixture (do not drain the water from the mixture).

Slowly fold in self-raising flour.

Pour into prepared cake tin and bake for 30-40 minutes. Cake should spring back when ready, or when a skewer is inserted the skewer should come out clean.

TOPPING

½ cup	Brown sugar
60g	Butter
⅓ cup	Milk
³ ⁄4 cup	Shredded coconut

Combine butter, brown sugar and milk in saucepan over medium heat. Stir until sugar dissolves. Add coconut and stir for a further 1-2 minutes. Remove cake from oven and evenly spoon coconut topping over cake. Return to the oven for a further 20 minutes, or until coconut is brown. Stand cake for 5 minutes before turning onto a wire rack or plate.

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
