Guest Speaker Ross Thornton

Ross Thornton, past President of Denmark Shire Council, was warmly welcomed to speak in place of our scheduled speaker from the Great Southern Development Commission.

Ross captured our interest immediately as he outlined his family history in Denmark, back to his first generation when Denmark's population was 400 people. From a farming background Ross moved to Perth for further his secondary education and following on to University and later pursued a career in Town Planning.

This interest led to his involvement Denmark Shire Council where he held the position of Shire President for 8 years.

His current involvements include WA Planning Commission and Great Southern Development Commission. From this background, past and present, Ross was able to present (without notes) a fully loaded hour of information examining WA's population predictions and strategies.

Of major concern is the continuing urban sprawl of Perth with a predicted 82% of WA's population by 2031.

Perth's expansion is equivalent to the distance from Denmark to Kojonup, 160km, and demands greater water distribution infrastructure than Tokyo surprising statistics.

Ross outlined the problems faced by the WA Planning Commission in providing transport networks for the rapidly expanding city. The Perth Transport Plan's on- going revisions include tunnels under the Swan River and additional rail/freeway networks.

Local Shire's Density Codes are in place for medium density development of large inner city blocks in older suburbs along with strict guidelines for the high rise developments.

Ross explained the importance of Royalties for Regions as a major player in decentralization along with initiatives such as Aging in the Bush. With the development of regional cities such as Busselton, once a quiet country town, now facing rapid population growth, Ross drew parallels for Denmark.

With the inevitability of Denmark's population growth comes an increasing need for the provision of health and education facilities along with expansion of commercial and residential areas. Plans for the industrial park were well in hand along with 780 residential blocks north of the town.

The need for a second bridge is currently a focal point and is under review. Ross reminded us of scenarios of fire or accidents blocking access to and from town and the implications for emergency evacuation or assistance.

Ross's presentation, based on local knowledge and planning expertise, was detailed, engaging and provided a snapshot of Denmark, past present and future.

His willingness to spend time with us at short notice was enthusiastically acknowledged.


