The Changing Face of Libraries

Robyn moved to Denmark in 1996, taking up a job in the Telecentre.

then transferring to the library in 2000. In 2001 the library became automated. Since then Robyn has led her vibrant team in bringing to us the everchanging technology of reading, listening and viewing for pleasure and information.

The Denmark library offers a range of books, e-books, audio books, e-magazines, DVD's, foreign language books, shire documents and reference books. Robyn made specific mention of the library edition of Ancestry, which will be of interest to many of us with the time to research our family history.

The Denmark library also houses a toy library, which is just one of the attractions for children here. There is a range of jigsaw puzzles, a story time programme led by Pat Evans and a number of gift packs to encourage babies and small children into the world of books.

Adults too are well catered for here. There is a book club support service and a growing number of book sets. An informal book chat group meets and talks about what they have read. The library regularly hosts well known authors. Second hand books are sold for a small donation. There is a writers' group that meets in the library monthly, as well as a Scrabble club. It is pleasing to note that the library is dyslexic friendly.

Recently Denmark was nominated for Australia's favourite rural library, and was a most deserving winner.

Robyn's talk was very informative and gave us an insight into the wide range of services we can access here in Denmark. Thanks to the hardworking library team.

The people who lived there have small apartments but they all eat at a central Cafeteria.




