Black Dog Rides

Bev and Rodger Seenev came to talk to

us about the Black Dog Rides. Every Denmark resident must be aware of the Annual ride which starts off Kwoorabup Community Park then roars offsomewhere.. We probably knew that the rides are to raise awareness of male depression in our society and to lift the unwillingness of males to seek help.

It was shocking to hear the statistics underlying this problem. Suicide is the leading cause of death in under 45 year olds and 80% of suicides are men. Steve Andrews started the rides in 2009 as a reaction to the loss of his own mother and then a friend and was supported by the Lions to ride around Australia. He took with him the iconic toy a small stuffed black dog which he named Winston after the reference of Winston Churchill to his own depression characterised by the presence of "the black dog"

With the growth of the Black Dog Ride movement all over Australia a request came from America to help with something similar there. There was a particular reference to the need to appeal to "first responders" whose jobs puts them in a very precipitous position with depression a common risk We watched Rodger's footage of the 70 factor. Aussies arriving in the USA to collect hired new or near new Harley Davidsons and, with escorts from police who organised road closures where appropriate and some 'first responders' they found their way right across the country and clearly had a great time. There was a lot of local radio coverage and Rodger asked one interviewer the size of his audience and was told that he would reach six and a half million people.

We were told that Black Dog Rides had raised a lot of money for their cause in Australia. Their main mission is to make men aware that admitting to depression and asking for help is the best thing to do and a motor bike rider would be an attractive male role model. The Club does not have the expertise to offer help directly but they fund Mental

Health First Aid Training courses and particularly target schools.

Roger and Bev had organised their talk so that there was a stream of short blocks of information from Roger, a short film to highlight what he had said and then Bev would give additional background. It was a novel and dynamic way to make the presentation and they must be complimented on it. The difficult topic was treated with sensitivity and their efforts are to be applauded.

Linda Bettenay

Linda came to talk to Probus about her books. I think the talk could easily have been described as

especially if you are writing a novel.

In Linda's case the real life raw material in each of her books is rich and vivid - two rival school bovs enlist and go off to war together in "The Apple Core Wars", Wishes for Starlight's story is based on a voung aboriginal boy who, deaf and mute, had been abandoned. He was rescued by two other small boys who took him home and so Linda has the skeleton for another story actually experienced within her immediate family. Secrets Mothers Keep tells about a family legend that had had one man supposedly dying on the Western Front. In fact he had come home to his family and was then the victim of a mentally unstable labourer who had been deprived of the medication that had kept him relatively stable up to that point. A murder occurred A chance discussion about the "Wubin Murder House" led to Linda's research and an Ancestry.Com alert which brought the whole story finally to light.

We were challenged to consider writing our own story. Linda talked about having to collect about 10 thousand words to produce a 400 word story. Her own writing practice is that she could write a book in about four months that would take about two years to adequately edit.
