The winter solstice, also known as midwinter, occurs when one of the Earth's poles has its maximum tilt away from the Sun. It happens twice yearly, once in each hemisphere. For that hemisphere, the winter solstice is the day with the shortest period of daylight and longest night of the year, when the Sun is at its lowest daily maximum elevation in the sky. At the pole, there is continuous darkness or twilight around the winter solstice. Its opposite is the summer solstice. An interesting idiosyncrasy relating to the winter solstice is that it does not feature the day with the latest sunrise and earliest sunset as is commonly expected. However, this day does have the least amount of daylight hours.

Some of our members are heading north to the warmth of the sun, travelling as far as Queensland. Lucky doers!

Bob showed his resilience from the outset when he battled on with his talk even though his slide projector was out of action due to a blown globe. The all important photos were, with Betty's diaries, all that was saved when the Ash Wednesday bushfire burned down their retirement home in Mount Macedon.

Bob told us of their mission to Papua New Guinea in the mid fifties. He and Betty had multiple skills for the work they were to do, Betty with her nursing training, pilot's licence, dental skills and the attitude to give things a go, which was to save more than one life; Bob with his engineering degree, pilot's licence and an ability to build almost anything that was required from the salvage left behind after the war.


