# **Guest Speaker**

Guest Speaker for November, Carol Webb.

This month's guest speaker was Carol Webb, speaking about her booklet "Have you had the conversation?"

Carol was widowed when her husband died of cancer aged 70. She was faced with all sorts of difficult tasks when she was at her most vulnerable. As a result of her distress, she decided to make things easier for others finding themselves in this situation.



She gave some examples of the things she was faced with, such as receiving a Telstra reimbursement cheque in her husband's name, but being unable to bank it, and being told that she needed a probate form, but then finding out she didn't require one. Through these issues, she became involved with the Grief Centre. She learned from the experiences of others that finances can be cut off to the bereaved person and that credit cards can be declined. The people you deal with at the ATO, Centrelink etc can be insensitive. People who are not familiar with computer communication can have difficulties.

Carol has listed things in her booklet that will help people to prepare for the death of a loved one and not be caught out when the time comes. Such things as the Enduring Power of Attorney, Enduring power of Guardianship and Advance Health Care Directive should be discussed and prepared for. Even funeral preferences, e.g. who is the preferred person to give the eulogy, can be discussed.

The booklet is a useful starting point to "having the conversation."

Steve and I can also recommend the Death Cafe, where you can discuss everything associated with death and dying, and it meets monthly at the Garden Room of the CRC.
