## **Guest Speaker**

#### Kaye Millar from Blossoms Nursery Q& A Session

I was really impressed by the depth of knowledge Kaye demonstrated as she answered all the questions put to her without batting an eyelid. There were no moments when she had to pause to think about something before answering. The answers came quickly and readily. Kaye clearly has a fantastic knowledge of horticulture.

Once upon a time, many moons ago, I could take shorthand at 120 words per minute. Whereas I can still take notes in shorthand after a fashion, my speed is nothing like what it used to be. I didn't get everything that was said, and you might disagree with some of this, but here is what I manage to glean from the Q & A session that took place with Kaye.

- 1. The first question was about why someone's azalea was growing beautifully but did not have any flowers.
  - A. Kaye countered by asking if it as in the right position; and whether the person had fed it. She suggested choosing a special azalea food.

There were a lot of questions concerning the growing of avocados.

- Q. Can you grow avocados from seed and have them fruit?
- A. Yes, you can. They grow easily from seed, but it could take anything up to 17 years for them to fruit. It may be good, maybe not. They do make a lovely tree, but they tend to be generally short lived. It is better to get a grafted one. They need excellent drainage. It also needs a mate another tree for cross fertilization. Feed them to get a crop. Don't feed in winter. Feed every other month with a good complete fertilizer. Can be rose or citrus fertilizer.
- Q. How do you prune an avocado?
- A. Straight across the top. If you do it any time from now, you need to paint it immediately to prevent disease. You can cut them really hard.
- Q. Another avo question. Ours has rust on its leaves. It has been given trace elements and sheep manure.
- A. Could be a pathogen, or borer. Do you have dieback in your area?
- Bush mulch was used. That could be the culprit. Kaye suggested using an anti-rot potion such as Fozject liquid against phytophera. Pour it over the tree, or spring load inject the tree; or take the tree out (as Kaye would do).
- Q. Green trunks - susceptible to spraying for weeds.
- A. Avocado and Citrus. If you want to spray for kikuyu wrap the trunks.

There certainly was no shortage of questions being asked and there were no pauses or lengthy breaks between the questions. They came thick and fast; but Kaye was up for it.

Q. Onion weed. Can you kill the bulbs?

A. Short answer - Shift house! There is not only one bulb below the surface but a host of little bulblets as well. Zero Concentrate – it will kill oxalis and onion weed. Cut it and paint it immediately while it is still oozing.

- Q. Celery Nodules
- A. They are caused by an imbalance in the soil. They need lime. Every time you get your vegie beds ready add lime, blood and bone and chook poo.
- Q. Spinach and Silver Beet chocolate spot.
- A. It is our conditions. This spore will always be in the soil. It is up to the weather whether it manifests or not. Burn or bin it.
- Q. White spots on a Pittosporum hedge, about 20m long.
- A. Scale. It will spread rapidly. You need to spray with White Oil. If you wanted to do it systemically you would have to use Triforine, a rose fungicide, which will kill scale but is more difficult to use. Kaye would recommend White Oil.
- Q. Is there any benefit to adding coffee grounds to your garden. [Person asking lives at Springdale Beach.].
- A. Acidic soil. You need to add lime to it. But, yes, there is benefit in adding coffee grounds. Tea does the same thing. Not on your maiden hair fern though. Give it a half strength liquid fertiliser.
- Q. Should I give my fingerlime fertiliser.
- A. Yes, standard citrus fertiliser.
- Q. Why has my hydrangea have a woody base.
- A. Old age.
- Q. Dwarf cherry how to prune. It has a long leader.
- A. Reduce leader. Take out and put it in a pot with premium potting mix. Add a little lime but not too much. Nice sunny protected spot. In September add fertiliser to pot.
- Q. Cherry slugs.
- A. The early stage starts off in the soil. If you have no chooks, then you need to watch and act. Hose tree with water and throw lime or wood ash at it. Nature lure organic gel, spray on tree.
- Q. When do you prune raspberries?
- A. Now. Take out old wood to ground level. Loves organic matter. Give slow-release fertiliser. It will respond well.
- Q. I have a mango with 4 leaves. It is 5 years old. It has done nothing.
- A. It is sulking. It does not like the SE side. Dig it out and put it in a pot. Put it in a hot spot facing North. Loves fertiliser.

Kaye once found some mango trees in the bush. They had been neglected but were in a very protected area with improved soil. They had loads of fruit.

- Q. Apricot pruned down lots of growth. Cut to ½ or cut next year?
- A. Some apricots fruit only on 2<sup>nd</sup> year wood. Hit and miss pruning method. Cut 1 leave next. In spring give a complete fertiliser.
- Q. Caterpillars on Cape Lilacs?

- A. Nothing works. Malathion would get rid of them; but my advice, don't plant one.
- Q. Roos and Roses
- A. Marriage made in heaven. Roses will always be their go to plant. Fence them off.
- Q. Clivia in pot no flowers. At least 2 years old. Look healthy.
- A. Needs splitting up.
- Q. Clivia yellow leaves.
- A. Feed them anything. [I heard on Gardening Australia since that that is also caused by them getting too much sun. Move them into deeper shade.]
- Q. Chile thrips on roses. Do we have them here?
- A. Not that we know of. However, if you were to buy one in Perth and bring it down here, you could also bring them.
- Q. Camelias had 10 now only 3 left. Gave them cow and chook manure.
- A. Chook poo too alkaline. Cow poo is good. Chook poo is great in vegie beds but is not good on acid loving plants. Cow poo is good if it is well aged. Fish no good.
- Q. Have you heard of putting a living mulch of violets around avocado trees?
- A. I would not do it. It would upset the avocado because they have a lot of tiny roots that grow up into the mulch and the violets would rob them of nutrients.
- Q. Which trees are fire retardant?
- A. Anything but natives. Not pine. Not too close to the house. Under an ember attack if they lodge in anything like a Peppermint tree it will explode. Peppermint trees are a fire hazard.
- Q. Liverwort what can be done about it?
- A. In the hot weather put black plastic over it. That will cook it. It usually occurs in areas of poor drainage and in shade. A copper solution 3 times. Our soils have no copper left. Citrus likes a bit of copper, but not too much. ½ strength folia spray.
- Q. Rye grass in lawn.
- A. Dig it out. Weed and feed does not work. Kikuyu will eventually take over. Regular mowing helps.
- Q. Frangipane doesn't flower.
- A. Liquid Potash spray up stems and top part of plant. Needs a hot spot in full sun.
